# St George's Cathedral

On 15 November 1888, St George's Cathedral was consecrated by Bishop Parry, the second Bishop of Perth 1877-93. The Cathedral is a beautiful example of the traditional English Victorian Gothic Revival Style of architecture.

It was designed by Sydney architect Edmund Blackett who died in 1883 prior to the building's completion. St George's Cathedral has long been a strong focal point for worship within the Diocese and City of Perth. It is the home of a vibrant worshipping community.

It also has served the wider Perth community as the scene of cathedral church services to commemorate important events within the life of Perth and the whole Western Australian community.

The Cathedral is one of the principal buildings within the heritage precinct including Government House, Perth Town Hall and the old Treasury Offices. Its architecture, furnishings, fittings, stained glass windows and memorials are an expression of cultural and religious heritage with links dating back to the earliest days of European settlement and beyond.

As with other unique heritage buildings that are more than 100 years old, there is a need for constant care to prevent the Cathedral from deteriorating and to ensure that any renovations are consistent with the character of the original building. This work is both ongoing and expensive.

It is important for the Cathedral to remain as a well-maintained building that serves both as a reminder of our past history, and also provides all those facilities required to meet the needs of future generations.



## Who Are The Friends?

The Association of Friends of St George's Cathedral was founded in 1965. Friends are worshipping members of the cathedral community but some are from other parts of Western Australia or live overseas.

The object of the Association of Friends, as outlined in its Constitution, is to bind together all who care for the Cathedral and desire to take some part in maintaining its worship and fabric and in enhancing its beauty.

The Friends support the Dean and Chapter in their concern for the physical welfare of the Cathedral. Support is achieved through the regular financial commitment made by the Friends. Members who live locally also help in a variety of other ways, including acting as pastoral assistants, stewards, guides, or bell-ringers, arranging flowers, catering or assisting in the Cathedral Gift Shop.

Membership of the Friends is open to anyone who has a concern for the Cathedral or an interest in any part of its life. The Association of Friends is administered by a management committee, chaired by the Dean.

### What Do The Friends Achieve?

Each year the Association of Friends has responded to requests from the Dean and Chapter for assistance in financing particular projects that help to maintain or enhance the Cathedral.

In recent years, the Friends have contributed towards:

- Burt Hall upgrading of kitchen equipment and security
- Electrification of the Cathedral Bell, and installation of clock chime
- Provision of new Vestments
- Establishment and furnishing of the Cathedral Friends' Meeting Room in the Education Centre
- A new collection box
- Restoration of Cathedral furniture
- A new offertory box
- Repair of the historic Roe chalices
- New flower stands
- New candle stands
- Bookmarks for visitors

The Friends sponsor social events and assist with their organisation, including catering. These include events where members of the cathedral community may enjoy good fellowship, and provide valuable opportunities for networking and outreach to the wider community.

They also include events where members of the cathedral community and invited guests may have an exchange of views on matters of mutual interest and/or learn more about activities of the Cathedral.
